# PPG Meetings with the Management of the surgeries

# NATURE NEEDS YOU – HELP INFORM HAMPSHIRE'S LOCAL NATURE RECOVERY STRATEGY

Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council is working with Hampshire County Council in developing a Local Nature Recovery Strategy (LNRS). Different from Basingstoke and Deane's emerging Biodiversity Strategy, the LNRS is mandated in the Environment Act 2021 and delivered at a county scale. It will identify the core of our nature recovery networks and strategically important areas for habitat creation and enhancement. The County Council has been appointed by the Government to lead the preparation of the county's strategy, working with all of the county's local councils, as well as the wildlife and farming organisations, national parks and environmental and conservation organisations.

The Councils want residents, community groups and organisations including businesses, parish councils and other interested individuals or groups to take part in a survey asking where they would like to

see improvements for nature recovery, what their views for nature priorities are and what action they may be taking to help nature in their area.

Gathering this information is an important first step in the development of a Local Nature Recovery Strategy which aims to ensure Hampshire's natural environment is restored for today's and future generations.

Completing the online survey should take only a few minutes and will provide valuable information.

Working with the Hampshire & Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust, the County Council is also arranging a series of community workshops. Details of these will be available in the New Year on the County Council website (Local Nature Recovery Strategy for Hampshire), so keep a look out for more information.

# **COUNCILLOR'S UPDATE**

There are some huge issues that will affect the Hatch Warren and Beggarwood area coming to the fore at the moment.

**LOCAL PLAN UPDATE:** The Borough Council's Cabinet has agreed to go out to consultation on the draft of its local plan, to the year 2040. This is a massive document, but the main thrust is that it proposes building homes in the Borough at an average rate of 850 per year, which is not a slowdown in development, and it allocates sites for development accordingly.

SITES PROPOSED FOR DEVELOPMENT: Most of the development in the draft local plan update is proposed for the West of Basingstoke: sites include Manydown North (4,000 homes), Southern Manydown (5,000 homes), Hounsome Fields (750 homes, started), the Golf Course (1,000 homes, started), land known as 'South West Basingstoke' (4,500 homes and potential site for the new hospital), and Popham airfield (3,000 homes). This totals over 18,000 homes and means that development will reach from the A339 Kingsclere Road in the North all the way down to M3 Junction 7 and the A30.

**CABINET MEETING:** I attended the Borough Council's Cabinet meeting and asked that the Councillors review the draft plan to investigate whether recent announcements from the Government give them scope to reduce the build rate for the Borough. I believe there is such scope, but they declined to do this.

**NEW HOSPITAL CONSULTATION:** The NHS in Hampshire is consulting on proposals to build a new hospital, invest in Winchester hospital and make changes to acute hospital services in Basingstoke and Winchester. As part of its statutory duties, the Hampshire and Isle of Wight Integrated Care Board is running the consultation. The preferred site for the new hospital is near M3 Junction 7 and funding has been secured. The web page to join the consultation is at https://www.hampshiretogether. nhs.uk/ Alternative just type HAMPSHIRE TOGETHER into your search engine: it will take you to the right place.

THIRD APPLICATION FOR WAREHOUSES: A new application has been submitted for warehouses on the Oakdown Farm site, opposite the preferred site for the new hospital. By the time you read this, the consultation period will have closed, and then it will be a case of watching for the application to come before the Development Control committee.

**SALE OF OPEROSE:** It has been announced that Operose is selling its UK operation to a company called HCRG. This will affect the Camrose, Gilles, Hackwood and Beggarwood surgeries. The surgeries' Patient Participation Group is asking for a dialogue with the local Integrated Care Board, which is responsible for monitoring the NHS England contract awarded to the practice, and representatives from HCRG so that it may understand the implications of this change.

Now, some of the more 'routine' issues:

**KEMPSHOTT ROUNDABOUT:** Over the holiday period there was considerable flooding on the Kempshott roundabout, which

caused the inside lane to be blocked. The roundabout is drained through soakaways and I was worried that the water table might have risen so high as to stop them working. No, that was not the cause: it was a blocked drain that runs through the centre of the roundabout that was blowing back through a manhole cover. Thames Water attended to clear the problem (and hopefully the blockage).

BRIGHTON HILL ROUNDABOUT: Following the opening of the revised roundabout, I have had some detailed points brought to my attention regarding lane markings and signage. I am looking to broker a meeting to discuss them. Some of the road signs seem to be badly positioned and some lanes could be better marked to advise motorists how best to position their vehicles. In general, however, the roundabout appears to be working well and the extra capacity was sorely needed.

**BROADMERE ROAD ADOPTIONS:** At the time of writing the outstanding issue barring the way to adoption is the repair and resiting of some of the streetlights in the Broadmere Road area. This is something that the developers have to carry out. I am assured that all legal documents have been prepared to move quickly to adoption after that. I have some issues that I want to progress after the adoption has gone through.

**MEETING ABOUT NEW HOMES:** I attended a meeting with residents of two new developments along the A30, who reported problems with build quality and access issues. A residents' association is being formed to help present the problems to the developers.

CHRISTMAS QUIZ SUCCESS: lain Friar has contacted me to report on the success of the Christmas Quiz he organised in the Cafe in the Park, Beggarwood. 18 teams took part, and the winners were the Modest Mouses. The next quiz is scheduled for Friday 1st March (St. David's Day). Early booking for teams of 4 to 6 is recommended to ensure a space: please call the office on 01256 811262.

**CYCLING CONSULTATION:** I attended the first consultation event held in the Baptist Church, Gershwin Road. Hampshire County Council is considering how to improve cycling and walking links from the Hatch Warren roundabout, along the Winchester Road and into town. It does not have a favoured solution in mind at the moment, but wants to capture peoples' comments to help produce one. At the Hatch Warren end, I urged them to consider solutions that would not take width off the A30 carriageway. Having just spent £20 million to improve throughput at the Brighton Hill roundabout it would seem counter-productive to reduce capacity on one of the main roads leading to it.

**ST MARK'S SCHOOL** is running a petition to save its school crossing patrols and is inviting everyone to sign it. Details are on its Facebook page.



# PROBUS LEARN THINGS ABOUT CRICKET

The fact it was a bitterly cold day encouraged the members of the Probus Club of Basingstoke to think about summer days and hearing the strike of willow on leather as their guest speaker, Mike Brook, reminisced about his interest in that most English of games, cricket. Hampshire is home to the Hambledon Cricket Club, founded in 1750, known as the cradle of cricket, where many of the laws of the game were formulated.



Most people learn something new every day and this occasion was no different. Because this was Mike Brook's 222 speaking engagement, the cricket aficionados understood that this could be termed a double Nelson. Apparently, a Nelson in cricket is when the score is on III runs and considered unlucky. It was named after Admiral Lord Nelson who, history incorrectly recorded, had one eye, one arm and one leg, which is not strictly true as he lost his sight but not his eye and had two legs when he died. And when



the three wickets are viewed without the bails look like III. Tradition has it that on this score the batters and umpires raise a leg to salute the Admiral.

But many question what it is about cricket that keeps many middle-aged men interested and playing the game long after much younger men have retired from other field team sports. It certainly is not an easy game and because the fear of physical injury is very common in recent years much protective equipment is worn by the two batters at the crease, the wicket keeper and those fielders positioned close to the batter. These days it is not correct to call them batsmen as more ladies take up the game. It is said to be character building although each match score book clearly show the failures. The greatest number of wickets being lost is when the score is at zero, so there is real pressure on the opening pair of batters. Pre-game nerves are only sated when the game is won. However, batters would prefer a good personal run total in a losing game than a poor score in a winning team.

The radio programme Test Match Special has changed over the years. One of the greatest commentators was Basingstoke's own John Arlott who was born at the



lodge house at the old cemetery on Kingsclere Road. He was broadcasting the first time a streaker ran across the pitch and called her a freaker. Something that women find fascinating with many copying this act over the years.

During wartime a cricket match was abandoned due to fog, but the commentators continued to broadcast this now fictitious game so as not to let the Germans know about the weather.

Mike Brook finished off by considering the closeness of cricket to golf by recalling the story of the radio programme with Eric Sykes coming home frustrated at his performance on the golf course and threw his bag of clubs into the corner. Hattie Jacques questioned why continue playing if it gets him into a bad mood, with the reply coming, "because it's the only pleasure I get".

# OLD DOWN & BEGGARWOOD WILDLIFE GROUP

great time for getting out. An awful lot of rain and so windy. One wonders how wildlife copes, especially the birds. But as we got into January there were some beautiful days of blue sky and sun – but very cold!

Nothing much to report concerning the 2 sites and work parties have not met up much due to Christmas/New Year and poor weather. So this report is not about anything that is particularly local but just something that you might find interesting: Moths

Moths – liked by some, avoided by some and feared by many! Did you know that moths are better pollinators than bees. There are around 2,500 species in the UK, of varying sizes, colour and pattern. They play a key role in pollinating plants and flowers at night. Most moths fly at night but a few species fly in the day. One that you might see in your garden during the day is the *Humming-bird Hawk Moth*. This is a visitor (not a resident) between April and October.

Moths are around all year — there is the *December Moth* and the *Winter Moth*. The former is a deep brown, fluffy-looking moth with a thick body and a coat of long hair-like scales which help keep it warm in low temperatures. The adults do not feed — just search for a mate and lay eggs under the bark of oak, birch and hawthorn. The latter is not hairy but delicate with fine wings and it is only the male that flies. The largest resident moth found in the UK is the *Privet Hawk moth* — fills the palm of your hand.

Just reminding you that the group is looking to set up a monthly Saturday work party on Old Down. Perhaps a work party on a Saturday would be of interest to you – if so please email the group and we will reply.

**Work Parties:** For Old Down we meet outside Old Down Hall every Thursday 10-12noon (but not in the rain!) and for Beggarwood at the café on the first Tuesday of the month 9-12noon. Please do come and join us — we really do need new members and support. Check the website for further information.



# WINDMILLS AT **DUMMER**


It seems hard to picture now, but in the 18th and Nineteenth centuries there were two windmills close to us in Hatch Warren and Beggarwood, both at Dummer. Two windmills in close proximity to each other demonstrates the agricultural nature of the area and the amount of grain being produced by local famers which then needed to be processed prior to transportation by local turnpike and canal. One windmill, first mentioned in the mid 1700s, was situated at the highest point in Dummer at Priest Down, the other was at Little Manor Farm. In 1818, grinding two sacks of barley at Little Manor cost four shillings.


In 1833 Little Manor Mill was hit by fire which could be seen from the turnpike road which led up Kempshott Hill. Although mill fires were frequent as flour dust is highly flammable, the mill had not been worked for three weeks and perhaps as the swing riots were still a close memory, arson was suspected, especially as there had been another arson attack in Dummer quite recently. Following the fire the mill was not rebuilt.

# FROM THE DESK OF OUR MP

As residents know, plans for our new hospital are well underway. A huge amount of work has already happened and last year we achieved two key milestones:

- I. £900 million was ring fenced by the Government to fund the new hospital and improvements to Winchester hospital, making this the largest infrastructure project in our town's history
- 2. The New Hospital Public Consultation was launched on the 11th of December and will run until the 17th of March

Reaching the position at which a public consultation can be launched demonstrates the advanced stage of these plans. The consultation is open now and residents can have their say, including to give their thoughts on where the hospital should be located.

The consultation document which is mercifully short and easy to understand, outlines the available options and justifies the hospital Trust's preferred option on clinical grounds, putting safety and the health of our community first.

These plans represent a once in a generation opportunity. They will enable the latest technologies to be available, modernising the way healthcare is carried out, whilst allowing us to adapt to the changing needs of Basingstoke's rapidly ageing population.


The new hospital is not only for us using it today, but for all who come after us for the next 50 years. For these reasons, it is essential that as many people as possible have their say so we can help ensure our new hospital delivers what we need.

The NHS is planning to open the brandnew hospital's doors in 2032, but I am doing all I can to make the case that this date ought to be earlier. Demonstrating strong public support for the plans is an important element. Unlike other places in the country, our Hospital Trust, Borough Council and County Council are in complete support of the project. I have been reiterating this to the Government and will continue to do so, arguing that this broad support and the maintenance costs at the current Basingstoke Hospital warrants us moving forward more quickly.

# Why do I have so little faith?

I write this article at a time of seemingly unparalleled uncertainty and gloom. Societal and world events have hitherto headed in unprecedented directions, with many of us feeling like onlookers or pedestrians with no sense of control. The implications of the Al genie being let loose, extreme weather patterns, cost of living crises and the current post office IT scandal all contribute to a growing sense of unease. The suffering from conflicts between Ukraine and Russia, Israel and Palestine only exacerbate our worst fears, with some commentators suggesting a much larger war erupting across the Middle East and perhaps beyond.

It will therefore come as little surprise that Reuters have reported a sharp decline in followers of mainstream news with as much as 40% of individuals no longer having a strong interest in following regular events. What perhaps is more interesting is another related finding, that less access to news and more interaction with friends, family and community significantly increases our sense of well-being. We may not have the power to change or even influence any of the above directly, but we can make a significant difference at a personal and local level.

At a personal level, I am ashamed to admit that I have held a grudge against someone for many years. Someone who wrongfully dishonoured our immediate and wider family. So much so that even visiting a once much-loved place in Somerset where this person lives, caused me considerable heartache. Yet, introducing this lovely market city of Wells to someone else in our family this Christmas completely transformed my thinking, and with fresh eyes recognised the importance of forgiveness, yes even letting go of the past. I also began to question again my own lack of faith to enact change, something lesus encountered repeatedly among his disciples.

One occasion recorded in Matthew's Gospel (17:1-20) begins with a very select group of disciples Peter, James and John returning from a literal mountain top experience, where Jesus "... was transfigured before them. His face shone like the sun, and his clothes became as white as the light. Just then there appeared before them Moses and Elijah, talking with Jesus."

Yet, just a few verses later with their fellow disciples they are rebuked for not healing a demon possessed boy. To their credit, albeit in private, they came to Jesus and asked, why couldn't they drive out the demon to which he stunningly replied, "Because you have so little faith. Truly I tell you, if you have faith as small as a mustard seed, you can say to this mountain, "Move from here to there," and it will move. Nothing will be impossible for you." Jesus often talked in parables to illustrate a moral or spiritual truth. Even contrasting one of the tiniest seeds to figuratively moving a mountain. Sometimes that mountain is purely and simply our own mindset as I experienced and was for so long unwilling to change.

# HAPPY BIRTHDAY!

CAFÉ INTHE PARK will be six years old on 10th February. It was built as a Community Centre for the Beggarwood area, though the building turned out to be smaller than had been originally hoped. The Hatch Warren Community Association agreed to take over the running of it, and they made some momentous and very good decisions.

The first departure from 'normal' was to position the Community Centre as a café. Father Michael from the local church was a champion of this idea, and it enabled the centre to cater for the natural market of dog walkers who regularly use Beggarwood Park. The Association invested in, and acquired grants for, outdoor seating and table facilities for that purpose.

That led to them branding the building as 'Café in the Park', a name that has proved effective and which positions its activities extremely well.

The Association has had to build up a more varied programme than many community centres. It wasn't allowed to use the building for a play school, given that there was already such a business next door. This removed the possibility of a major source of revenue that other centres enjoy.

As a result, the Café in the Park today hosts a myriad of events including Community Lunches, Ramblers Wellbeing walks, Card and a Cuppa sessions, Beggarwood Bookworms, a 'Next Steps' bereavement group and quarterly fund-raising quizzes.

They also use or hire the room out for one-off events: many people have enjoyed singing Christmas Carols there, and there have been community meetings such as discussions on the local surgery and 'Community Chats' with the local Member of Parliament.

The finances suffered during the COVID-19 shutdowns and the committee is still working hard to recover fully. It is a great children's party venue and community space.

At six years old, the Café in the Park is now an integral and important part of our community. Many Happy Returns!

# PUREFOY ARMS IN SHOCK CLOSURE

The Preston Candover gastropub run by chef patron Gordon Stott made the shock announcement it would be closing its doors on January 27, 2024. Despite his reputation as one of the top chefs in this part of the country, winning many awards and accolades for his cookery skills, and with the Purefoy Arms rated in position 67 of gastropubs in the country, unexpected happenings prompted this announcement.

This time last year this column reviewed the Purefoy Arms and at the time while the food was to a great standard the ambiance left something to be desired. If the high quality on the plate is reflected in the price paid, normally the surroundings also need to have an upmarket feel to the place.

Even at that juncture, and in common throughout the hospitality industry, presumably there was a financial problem as he attempted the unusual tactic of trying to sell the remaining years on his lease. The Covid lockdowns coupled with increasing costs of food and fuel meant that the premises were only open from Wednesday to Saturday.

Although there has been outpouring of regret at this news on social media the Purefoy Arms needed more regular custom rather than it was the go-to place just for some special occasion. In recent times the freehold of the Purefoy Arms has been sold, but Gordon Stott has decided not to proceed with a new lease

and has yet to announce his plans in the catering industry. No doubt there will be many devotees who will be interested to see what the future holds as many followed him five years ago when he moved from the Rising Sun on the A30 at Dummer. Hopefully he will remain in our locality.





# **ROAST VEGETABLES**

What to do with those veg left at the bottom of your fridge. My usual ingredients are onions, sweet potatoes, squash, carrots, peppers, tomatoes, aubergines — sometimes there might be a fennel bulb. If there aren't any tomatoes, I use a tin of chopped tomatoes. Add garlic if you have some. Prepare the veg and cut into cubes. Place in a roasting tray and cover with about 10 tablespoons balsamic vinegar and 8 tablespoons of olive oil. Mix well. Add freshly ground pepper and some herbs — perhaps a couple of bay leaves or some oregano. Cover with tin foil and roast in a slow oven (150 degrees) for about an hour and a half or until cooked. Stir a couple of times.

The roast veg can be used to make lasagne, serve with pasta or jacket spuds. Perhaps stir in some spinach or kale before serving. Or - blitz the roasted veg to make a sauce and freeze to be used with pasta for a quick and easy future supper. Enjoy!


